Waiting For The Big Game

"It's a big honor for me to play and to represent Stevens," is how senior Collin Belt describes his selection to the upcoming New Hampshire-Vermont Maple Sugar Bowl Shrine Football Game at Castleton State College August 6.

While much of the anxiety around Stevens High School in Claremont these days is focused upon the upcoming St. Joseph's Sports Night, scheduled for March 30, one Stevens senior has to wait through the summer months to display his talents upon the football field for one more time as a high school studentathlete. Although he will have graduated by the August 6 extravaganza, Belt is anxiously awaiting that one final time when he can get together with friends and former competitors he associated with during his high school days.

"I'm also excited to be playing with Stephan again and with Christian Lawrence of Newport after playing against them the last few years," Belt added while being interviewed in a classroom at Stevens.

"Stephan" is Stephan Nix, the much honored stellar athlete, both in football and wrestling, at Newport High School, a strong rival of the Claremont school. Nix is also a long and close friend of Belt's as the two grew up together on

the streets of Claremont. Both athletes made out extremely well from having to transfer their residences while maturing during their formative years. Belt lived in Springfield, VT,

until midway through his sixth grade when his family made the transition from the Green Mountain State to the Granite State.

"I started playing the mini-Cardinals football program in Claremont while still living in Springfield," Belt reported, "and played with Stephan up until seventh grade. He's pretty much my

best friend."

Belt, son of Richard and Jada Belt, is a strong New England Patriots fan, as is the entire family, and his confession to admiring and idolizing Teddi Bruschi, Jerod Mayo and Tom Brady while

growing up bolsters that fact. His mom is a past cheerleading coach at Stevens and coached this past season at Kearsarge, which may have something to do with the fact Collin's girlfriend at Stevens is Alexis Parliman, a junior cheerleader. Mrs Belt has also been the Shrine Game's cheerleading coach for the past six years and will be doing it again this year, thus getting a field level view

of her son's talent on the gridiron.

Back in November, when Belt first learned of his selection, he stated he remembered the mail lady delivering a yellow package from the Shrine office. "I was so excited my hand was shaking," said Belt as he recalled that infamous afternoon. "I even was bleeding under my fingernail from a cut I got from the paper

opening the envelope. I called my parents and my grandma and my Uncle Bill Gobin, even though it said the information wasn't supposed to be released publicly on social media, but I figured I could, at least, call my parents."

The call to Gobin came without any restraint on Belt's part. "I looked up to Billy," Belt uttered, with

reverent awe toward his uncle. "He got me started on watching all the games with him and he would tell me all about the different coverages, but back then in the third grade I didn't understand it and would just say uh, huh, yuh, yuh."

principal, and her husband, a former Shrine Game player, to Belt congratulating him on his selection to the prestigious post-season contest is something Belt said pleased him to no end.

"Coach Silva has always been there motivating me," Belt was quick to point out. "He was hard on me at practice, but it paid off, definitely. He is more than just a coach. He cares about the players."

Paul Silva has been the head coach at Stevens for the past five years. He has had the good fortune to have had six players named to the Shrine Game prior to Belt in that span of time. They include Cam Blewitt in 2012, Logan Batchelder and C.J. Gosselin in 2013, Kai Kleyensteuber and Donald Pellerin in 2014. Belt's selection this season follows a 2015 season in which no one was picked for the August event.

"I am thrilled for Collin," Silva stated in his office at the high school overlooking Middle Street. "He has called the defense for us in the huddle ever since he was a sophomore. Any time you get a kid picked for a game like this it is exciting. It is great and he is real pleased, and I am for him. He is a very coachable kid, a solid kid. Any time you get a kid selected to a post-season game it gets the school's name out there."

Belt has applied to four schools and has been accepted at all four. He has not made a decision, as yet, where he will go. New Hampshire Technical Institute in Concord, Keene State College, Castleton State College and the University of New Hampshire are the four schools to which he has applied. He plans to major in business management.

This will be the 63rd annual Shrine Game and kickoff time is 5:30 p.m. New Hampshire leads 46-13-2 in the series, the first game having been played on Labor Day in 1954 in Nashua. All proceeds benefit the Shriners Hospital For Children in Springfield, MA, and Montreal, Canada and the Boston Burns Institute in Boston. Over \$4,500,000 has been raised over the first 62 games.

Coach Silva has been a part of the game in the past and is, again, called to be an assistant coach in 2016.

"Yes, I will be on the staff, so I can coach him one more game," Silva said of Belt, a linebacker. "He is going to have an awesome experience. I thought it was a fantastic experi-







Review: Christian Music's Finest

I had the extreme pleasure of attending The Rock & Worship Roadshow Tour, presented by Compassion International, featuring some of Christian Rock's finest artists, when it was in Texas. We traveled nearly 4 hours for the event, and although it was a rough trip, it was more than worth it. While there we saw Newsboys, Audio Adrenaline,



From the moment the first artist hit the stage, there was no stopping the momentum that rolled forward with a vengeance. It wasn't only a Rock concert, it was a Rock concert with a purpose and a message: living faith-filled lives of de-

votion and hope, no matter where you're from, what you've done, what you face, or who you've been. The energy and electricity that filled the air were matched only by the dedication of each artist to give the audience the very best of themselves. Of course, those familiar with each of these artists would expect nothing less. I cannot remember how many times my eyes filled with tears from the beauty and grace that filled the air. Between the music, the genuine love flowing between the artists and the audience, and the message of perpetual hope for all, I have never experienced anything more powerful or lovely in a room full of hundreds... perhaps thousands.

Along with the fantastic entertainment, donations were accepted for Compassion International and their efforts to help children in Haiti and other countries abroad. Some of the items sold at the artists' booths were even made in Haiti by orphan children. (In fact, I'll be giving a couple of those away in one of the drawings this year.) Rather than simply looking to rake in the money for themselves, these artists and those operating

the event were on a mission: to entertain the fans while also raising money for children in

need. At one point, Michael Tait (lead singer for Newsboys) even left the stage to interact with children near the stage. It was incredibly sweet, and the looks on those kids' faces were priceless. He gave those children a gift that they will never forget, and he did so while also sharing the gift of God's word and love with them through Newsboys' music.

Each and every one of these artists rocked the house with family-friendly, uplifting music that rivaled and even exceeded anything the mainstream can offer. During the concert, one could look around and see people ranging in age from six to 60, from all apparent walks of life. There were young children, teens with Mohawks, nose rings, and tattoos,

and even senior citizens all singing, dancing, and smiling together as one big group of friends... I dare say as one big family. It made me remember a lesson that my daddy taught me: strangers are merely friends we have yet to meet. People were polite to one another, with no swearing or rudeness to be found. People were even

happy to move over to let you through when in the busy walkways. Not only did the artists give their all on stage, but these incredible artists even stayed late after the event to meet their fans and sign autographs. My heart went out for them. They were so very tired from the high-energy evening, but they were still all smiles and love for each and every guest until the venue closed it down.

Although there are only 5 Crosses available for my rating system, I give a resounding 10 Crosses to each and every one of these artists, both as groups and as individuals. The talent and love that they shine with is exactly what you would expect from strong Christian men and women. In a world where one sees many who claim strong Christian views but don't show those views in how they live, it was easy to see that these artists truly walk the walk. They radiated with it. If you get the chance to see any of these artists, do so. You will be thankful that you did. I simply cannot say so enough.

You might say that it's easy for me to gush about hope and love when I myself do not truly understand suffering. However, I will tell you... Many of my faithful readers already know that I am disabled and experience pain beyond words as well as



They helped me regain my hope and replenish my strength to fight my ailments. This evening of worship deeply impacted this journalist, and I am still thanking God for it today. I am also thankful for the gift of these generous artists to share so much of themselves for people like me. I'm thankful they received and accepted the calling. So, I speak from personal joy in the midst of pain. I'm "Guilty." And I now listen to my Newsboys' album "Love Riot" as often as possible to remind myself of the need for me to remain hopeful in my fight against my illness. Faith can be a funny thing. As humans, we tend to be weak. But when we come together in prayer, we can renew each other's strength.






