

#### A Hidden Gem In Claremont

They haven't raced yet and they are chomping at the bit raring to go. The kids, I mean. In case you haven't noticed, and my guess is you haven't, there is something out there just waiting to burst at the seams. It is the Claremont Karting Series at the Claremont Speedway.

"People just haven't noticed," said Shelly Page during an interview late last week. "We've got to get the word out. No one knows about it. It is a hidden gem."

Rained out a couple of Sundays ago in its initial running of the 2016 season, the Claremont Karting Series, hopefully, will get underway May 15 after taking a week off for Mother's Day this past Sunday.

We all know how excited kids can get when they are pumped up for something they especially enjoy and when that joy is put at a standstill the kids get a bit antsy, sometimes frustrated, and begin to take it out on their parents and grandparents. That is why Bruce Batchelder hopes the weatherman will come through May 15 with a promise of no precipitation.

Batchelder, well-known in the racing circuit at the Claremont Speedway, has taken on the task of running the Claremont Karting Series for kids aged 5 to 12 and on up since his retirement from modified racing Batchelder, son of the famed Howard Batchelder, who raced in the 1950's and 1960's in the old jalopy days with his Ford Coupe number 99, retiring in 1967, began his own legend on the racing circuit in 1971 and, in his words, "raced every year since" before finally retiring, too, a short while ago. Batchelder, the son, circled the track over the last 40plus years in cars sporting the numbers 811, 311, and 77.

Racing fans surely know it is Sonny Rabideau who brought 311 to prominence. "I took it over when he retired," Batchelder confessed during the same interview with Page.

"His motor builder stayed with me for the whole time I raced," Batchelder reported.

As you might have guessed, racing is in his blood, and he is still with the sport, although, now, it is for the kids where all his attention is focused these days.

"I took the Karting Series over this year from Archie Archibald," Batchelder stated. "He and his wife Deb had a great thing started for the last five years and when they retired, nobody stepped up to the plate to take it over. There isn't another one around for 100 miles. I thought it was a good thing for the kids. I know my grandkids love it and I stepped up."

Racing on Sunday afternoons the Karting Series consists of as

many as 10 qualifying heats and then a 25-lap

feature. Gates open at 10 a.m. with activity starting at 11 a.m. and finishing somewhere between three and four in the afternoon. Wednesday evenings from 4:30 to 7:00 p.m. the go-kart kids practice right along with the big car drivers. The little track is a 1/8 mile banked oval inside the perimeter of the main racing circle.

"What I like about it," said Batchelder, " is that the kids all play together, then have to stop what they are doing, and go race. When they get done they all hang around with each other. It teaches them sportsmanship."

Page, the Karting Series right-hand person and self-imposed secretary, added, "They can

get irritated with each other during the race, but within five minutes the kids go shake hands. It takes a village to help the children. It is fun!"

To date, Batchelder and Page have held a couple of cart shows, one at Runnings in Claremont and one at McDonald's in Springfield, VT. "Runnings was very good to us," reported Page, and Batchelder chipped in with, "Both places we were very successful. We got the word out and we gave away hot dogs, chips, and soda and ran a raffle. It built a lot of interest. McDonald's pretty near doubled its business that day."

No more shows are planned since the racing season is now at hand and with Batchelder also interested in baseball and other summer activities the Springfield resident stated, "Time is running out."

What is planned, however, is for Batchelder and Page to showcase their Karts Friday evenings when the big boys race. "We'll put some on display Friday night so people can see what we do on Sundays," he quipped. "We are hoping for two or three shows under the lights during intermission. Nothing is etched in stone yet, though."

"The track has been amazing for us," said Page. "They have helped us out a lot. Jim Ambrose and Phil Hayes are the new track owners. "It is a truly beautiful facility," voiced Batchelder. "They are doing some really great things with it. Everyone seems happy with what they have seen. It was rundown pretty hard over the last few years. People get uptight and then they don't show up. Things get stagnant, especially when you don't enforce the rules. I like what I see now."


Batchelder was born and raised in the Londonderry, VT, area but came to Springfield in 1962 and has pretty much spent the rest of his life in the community. Asked if he misses racing Batchelder was quick to say, "Oh yeah! When I see them all out there I say to myself, 'I could still do that', and I could. But, moneywise, I really can't, now that I am retired."

Page was born in Charlestown and brought up in Keene but returned to the area 20 years ago and has remained in Charlestown.

Batchelder reported the cost for a brand new go-kart is in the \$6,000 range but most have used vehicles, which can be purchased in the \$1,000 to \$2,000 range. "We run our Series as a club to keep the costs down for parents and grandparents," Batchelder added. "It is all run by volunteers. Without them we wouldn't have anything to show. It is a good baseline to get the kids out. While spectators can get into the stands for free, it does cost to get into the pits."

There are currently seven division sponsors helping out with the registration process and pit entrance fees. All money received goes back into the program to alleviate fuel expenses, insurance costs, and any other unforeseen financial costs.

"I ask anyone interested to come on out Sundays," Batchelder expressed. "It is a great family sport. These kids are our future racers." Got Sports?

### Season Opens At Claremont Speedway With Plenty Of Action

Ricky Bly and Joey Jarvis were the big winners on opening night Friday at Claremont Speedway on April 29. Bly led the 25-car Super Street division under the checkers to top the 50-lap Richardson Memorial Race, while Jarvis made easy work of winning the 40-lap Modified feature.

Other winners of the season-opening event were Tyler Janovsky, victorious in the Limited Sportsman feature, and Josh Rondeau, who earned the Wildcat victory.

Dylan Bodreau led the full field of Super Streets to the green, with Joe Tetreault alongside him. Bodreau would set the pace the first five laps, with Rick Bly glued to his bumper, until Bodreau was shuffled back to third on lap six

With Bly then pacing the field, Aaron Fellows – from row four – was the other man noticeably on the move. Storming up to third on lap eight, and into second three laps later, the Croydon pilot pulled up on Bly's back bumper on lap 14.

Racing both nose-to-tail and wheel-to-wheel, they sailed around the third-mile oval inches apart, sometimes closer. The furious battle came to a head as the lead pair stormed through turn four on lap 19, sparks flying as they rubbed down the frontstretch, with Fellows then slowing with a cut tire, a souvenir of the contact between the two.

Fellows was able to stay on the lead lap, thanks to a caution flag, with his father, Allen Fellows then moving up to second to lead the furious pack in pursuit of Bly. By the time lap 27 was completed, Bly had opened up a 15-length lead, and would widen that to a full straightaway by lap 40.

A lap-40 caution, though, brought the field again to Bly's back bumper, with Aaron Fellows now all the way back up to fourth, behind Allen Fellows and 2015 track champ Jack McClay.


Aaron Fellows made quick work of moving up to second, but Bly held strong over the final three circuits to score the win. With both McClay and Geoff Rollins suffering late-race spins due to spent tires, Ben Poland made a thrilling charge to take third just ahead of John Lavoie, Tetreault completing his solid night's work in fifth.

Sean Bodreau led the first nine laps of the Modified main event, with Joey Jarvis virtually

glued to him.

with Jarvis inching ahead the
next time

Nick Boivin, running in the lead pack all night long, powered past Bodreau to claim second on lap 20. There was no catching the speedy Jarvis on this night, though, as he was able to open a 15-length lead before a lap-29 caution tight-

ened the field again.



Tyler Janovsky led all the way in the Limited Sportsman feature, at times opening a sizable lead, as Scott Vien and Gary Colburn battled for the deuce spot behind him.

With five laps to go, Janovsky held a fivelength advantage over Vien, but when the checkers waved to end the 25-lap event, it was Janovsky scoring the victory over Vien, Colburn, and Chris Emerson, as the

front four hit the stripe nose-totail. Not far back, Alexis Aiken came home fifth.

Josh Rondeau and Craig Smith led the Wildcats to the green, but it was Alex Poisson – from row two – taking the early lead, then holding Rondeau in his shadow until the Charlestown pilot dove low into turn one to snatch the top spot on lap 21.

The two would race the final

four laps under a blanket until Rondeau prevailed to score the win ahead of Poisson. Kodi Sabins came home third, with Smith and Greg Millette rounding out the top five.

Claremont Speedway will be back in action Friday, May 6, when the North East Street Stock Tour visits the third-mile speedplant. The Late Models will make their 2016 season debut on the same card, along with the sizzling Super Streets and Wildcats.

# **Busy Schedule Ahead For Cardinals Baseball**

Mother Nature interrupted two of the three games scheduled for the Stevens baseball team this past week, but the Cardinals did host the Bow Falcons on Friday afternoon at Barnes Park.

The two teams went 10 innings before the Falcons bats came alive in the 10th inning and they scored 8 times to break open a 3-3 tie for a hard fought 11-3 decision over Stevens.

The Cardinals took an early 1-0 lead in the bottom of the first as Noah Spaulding reached on an er-

ror, moved to second when Drew Grenier was hit by a pitch and came around to score on a Coby

single. Stevens made it 2-0 in the bottom of the third as Spaulding and Grenier both singled before Spaulding scampered home on a wild pitch.

Bow added a run in the top of the 5th on a single and three walks, and had the bases loaded with just one out, before Grenier came on in relief and started a 1-6-3 double play to get out of the inning.

It stayed 2-1 until the top of the seventh inning when Bow tied the game after a hit batter, a stolen base, and a pair of bunts, the last one a successful suicide squeeze. The Falcons would take the lead in the top of the 8th, 3-2, on a walk, stolen base, sacrifice bunt, and single.

The Cardinals were not done, however, as they refused to go quietly. Hussey and Zach O'Brien had back to back one out singles, before freshman Henri Bourque lined a clutch two out single to score Hussey with the tying run.

Stevens had a big opportunity in the bottom of the ninth, loading the bases with one out but Bow was able to get out of the jam and the Falcons would then generate 8 runs in the top of the 10th after two were out to spoil the day for the young Cardinals. Stevens battled all

game long and had two hits a piece from Hussey, Bourque, and freshman Derrick Stanhope. Ryan Napsey started for Stevens and pitched 4 1/3 innings before Grenier came on. He went on to throw 5 1/3 innings.

Due to the weather and postponements, Stevens now has 4 games in each of the next two weeks. They will host Mascoma in a makeup game at Barnes Park on Tuesday afternoon, before taking on the Tigers of Newport in a double header on Wednesday. Game one will be played at Newport at 3:30PM, with the nightcap being played at Barnes Park at 7PM. The Cardinals will wrap up the week hosting the Hillcats of Hillsboro-Deering on Friday afternoon at Barnes Park.

Marquez (W: 3-1) did not allow a run in his eight innings, walked two and struck out eight batters. Johendi Jiminian worked a perfect ninth as the Yard Goats salvaged the final game of the series.

# Vicious Beast of Addiction Part I

Many people who don't face addiction often tell sufferers of addiction to "just get over it" or to "just get help." Neither of those solutions is as simple as that. Addiction is more than a simple problem with a simple solution. It is an all-consuming, driving force that fills every fiber of your being with a need that is so powerful you feel you'll go crazy or die without it. It literally takes over one's mind and life. The sufferer might also feel there is nothing wrong with him or with the desire he seeks so desperately to fulfill.

How do I know this? I have known many people who suffered addiction: drugs, alcohol, sex, gambling, and more. Not good enough? Okay. I'll let you in on a little secret, my faithful readers: I have a history of alcoholism. I have been completely dry now for ten years, but I did suffer some minor setbacks twice during that time: one around 7 years ago, and another about a year and

a half ago. What does 'minor' mean? It means I caught myself a few times with drinks in my hand and was able to pour them out. Each lasted less than a week, and one look at my babies reminded me of why I could not allow myself to relapse. I'm luckier than most because I did have that failsafe in my two children. My children had been through a lot, and I knew I had to be their one constant. Thankfully, my children were the one saving grace for me that was strong enough to jolt me back to my senses.

Most people who suffer addiction don't have that. Not because they don't have anything as important as loved ones who mean everything to them, but because the addiction is so strong that it removes logical thought from the equation. It becomes a mental illness where the process of rational thought is, at times, impossible. It's not that the sufferer doesn't love his family, but the intensity of the need is so strong that he feels he simply can't fight it... and often doesn't want to. Giving into it seems to be the only way to ease the need.

The addiction can vary from one person to another in both severity and vice. However, for most, if not all, the addiction is there because the person has some void within himself. That void results in the person grasping desperately to fill the emptiness, end the pain, or find what is missing from his life. Sadly, it never works. Not all addictions can be seen easily. It could be shopping or even exercising. Some people will go into debt trying to spend their way to happiness or make themselves sick as they drive themselves into the ground physically and mentally exercising excessively (yes, it is quite possible). For the exercising obsession, this can even lead to drug abuse trying to "buff up" or get thinner, thinking they are fat. In truth, the only true answer is therapy to figure out what is causing that void and address it properly.





**Ammunition** and **explosives**: Contact local police or fire. Asbestos: Contact NH DES at 271-1370 for disposal info. Ask if

a private hauler is working in your area who might take your asbestos.

Automotive batteries: Take to parts store for cash back.

**Empty aerosol cans:** Can be recycled with scrap metal. Talk to your town. Fluorescent lights: May be taken at your town facility. Check with your town. Food Co-ops and Home Depot take may take CFLs (spiral bulbs), not tubes. Latex paint: Use kitty litter, sawdust, or shredded paper to dry out latex paint, then throw in your trash. Empty, dry metal cans may be recycled as scrap metal at your recycling facility. If it says "clean up with soap and water," it's latex. **Medicine:** See **www.twinstatesafemeds.com** for police stations taking meds. Medical sharps: Place in a rigid container such as a detergent bottle with cap, seal cap with duct tape, and label container with marker, "Sharps, not for recycling." Dispose of with regular trash by handing to a waste collector. See www.nh.gov/medsafety. Can now drop off at Lebanon Police Station. Propane or helium tanks and fire extinguishers: Propane an be exchanged or refilled at a distributor; or contact town transfer station about empty tanks. **Spray insulation tanks:** Empty before taking to transfer station for scrap. **Used motor oil:** Take to town transfer station or garage for recycling.




